
About this event



Speaker biographies



Professor Nick Braisby is Vice-Chancellor and Chief Executive Officer at Buckinghamshire New University. He is a Chartered Psychologist and Associate Fellow of the British Psychological Society. He studied Natural Sciences at the University of Cambridge and then read for a PhD in Cognitive Science at the University of Edinburgh. Nick obtained a British Academy postdoctoral research fellowship held at the London School of Economics.



Richard O'Neill was born and brought up in a traditional nomadic Romani family, an influence which continues to inform his work. A national literacy hero, he is an advocate of using literature to promote inclusion and social mobility. He is interested in how writers and educators ensure a proper understanding of authentic representation and portrayal of Travelling cultures. Richard has had several international literary, cultural and diversity award winning children's books published by Child's Play and Pearson.



Professor Margaret Greenfields has extensive experience of co-producing inclusive research and working with Gypsy, Traveller, Roma, refugee and migrant communities in the fields of health and educational engagement. She is increasingly developing her knowledge and practice in working with Showmen and Boaters to enhance their social inclusion. Margaret was an academic at Buckinghamshire New University and is now a Visiting Professor, continuing to support GTRSB into HE Pledge activities and a number of PhD students.



Michelle Russell, having traced her family back several generations, is immensely proud of her connections to travelling Showmen. Supporting her brother, professional dancer and choreographer, Adam Russell, she created visual resources to engage visitors with the immersive exhibition 'Fairground Reminiscence'. Collaborating with co-author Richard O'Neill, the ground-breaking children's book, 'The Show Must Go On', was written. Continuing their working partnership and shared passion for stories, Richard and Michelle have also created 'Trails of Tales that Travel'.



Sherrie Smith was born and raised in a traditional Romany Gypsy family, living in North London and Hertfordshire. Having had both a successful career as a business woman and a community activist she returned to education as a mature student; gaining her BA in Social Science, Community Development and Youth Work from Goldsmiths, University of London, in 2019. Sherrie works with Buckinghamshire New University as a research assistant on the Gypsy, Roma, Travellers, Showmen and Boaters in Higher Education Pledge project.



Samantha Heeson is a qualified librarian and leads on data analysis and management in Library and Student Services at Leeds Beckett University. She provides senior managers, decision makers and academic support colleagues with evidence and insight about learning resource usage, user engagement and library impact. She has worked in Registry, Strategic Planning and Student Centred Change Management teams, as well as in IT project management in a private enterprise. She is also an inclusion champion in the HE and library sectors. Samantha is of Showman heritage.

Natalie Aldridge leads the Data, Evaluation and Impact team at Go Higher West Yorkshire. With a background in youth work and the third sector, Natalie has worked with countless young people experiencing an array of inequalities and is passionate about ensuring research and evaluation findings have an impact on policy and practice.



Wendy Price is Head of Widening Access and Participation at the University of Sunderland. She has over twenty years' experience of working in higher education in a range of roles relating to inclusion and widening access. In her current role Wendy is the institutional contact for GTRSB students and provides a single point of contact to support students at each stage of the student lifecycle. As part of her wider role at the university, Wendy is responsible for providing strategic support for pre-16 educational outreach as well as scholarships and bursaries



Janet Brown is a project officer for Data, Evaluation and Impact at Go Higher West Yorkshire and is co-leading on the development of a regional multi-sector stakeholder forum for supporting GRT learners. She has a background in secondary teaching and, more recently, social research into inequalities.



Rebecca Rochon is an Associate Professor at Buckinghamshire New University and is actively involved in the development of education professionals as inclusive practitioners. She works across a variety of programmes aimed at developing teaching and learning practice in different contexts, from schools and HE to FE and professional environments.



Paula Strachan is Head Teacher of St Teresa's Catholic Primary School She is passionate in her mission to ensure that all children, regardless of their starting points, are able to shine and become the very best that they can be. She delights in the daily conversations with the children and strives to have a school full of smiles – not just on the children! The diverse school serves 54% of pupils from an ethnic minority group with 26% identifying as GRT. The school and leadership are used by the Catholic Education Service as a role model for schools.





She has 17 years of experience in the public sector along with working in voluntary equality roles. While working full time managing a social care finance department, she decided to study part time as a mature student at BNU. She achieved a first-class Business Management BA Hons. She confesses that balancing ethics and reality is a daily challenge, but she is motivated by seeing what people can change when they work together

lackie Bolton is a Traveller social worker of Romani and Showman background. As a child she travelled with her family in summer and attended school in winter. Attending university was never on the radar although she got good results as a student. She worked in the commercial sector for 20 years before joining a charity in the east of England and setting up an advocacy service for Travellers in 2003. She then went to university as a mature student and qualified as a social worker. She worked in children's and adult services, eventually specialising in supporting children affected by child sexual abuse, exploitation and violence. Jackie cofounded the Gypsy Roma Travellers Social Work Association. She believes the more Travellers who enter higher education the better and that the Pledge will help with increasing their access.



Charmaine Holmes, is a social work student. She joined university to make a positive difference to her community. "I went to school to tick the box of education rather than seeing it as important. I got married and had my first two children quite young, then as I got older and saw friends progress, I wanted something more and thought I could help my community. There's still stigma about Gypsies and Travellers from social workers, so I want to change perceptions and improve their outcomes".




Dr Natalie Forster is a Research Fellow in Applied Health and Social Care at Northumbria University, whose work centres around a commitment to addressing inequalities in access to public services. Her PhD research challenged common stereotypes about Traveller Community health beliefs, practices and needs, and explored how ethnicity as a Gypsy or Traveller intersects with other identity positions to shape health experiences. Natalie is currently undertaking research to understand the higher education experiences of students from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Communities, and representations of these groups within widening participation research, policy and practice.



Sarah Harder-Collins is Head of Participation and Success at the University of Winchester. Sarah has worked in widening participation for the past fourteen years, leading projects and campaigns to support underrepresented young people to access higher education at the University of Winchester and across national access programmes. She has a strategic responsibility for the university's Access and Participation Plan, and championed the University of Winchester to be a pathfinder signatory for the GTRSB Pledge. Drawing upon the values-driven innovative evidence-based practice supporting other under-represented student groups, last year the University hosted a national online conference to help shape UKwide policy and practice supporting GTRSB participation in higher education. This year, the University will be launching the GTRSB support package for students.
