## 2. Programme Summary

For BSc (Hons) Criminology

The Criminology undergraduate degree programme will give learners the opportunity to study crime and criminal behaviour. Different approaches to punishment will be examined alongside analysis of reoffending behaviour. Criminalisation and victimisation are key themes in the Criminology degree programme and learners will consider these in relation to the criminal justice system whilst also exploring links to wider social factors. The programme contains a focus on employability and learners will have the opportunity to volunteer for an organisation relevant to this programme which will help enhance learners' CVs for future graduate employment.

Following the core level 4 programme learners can opt to stay on the BSc (Hons) Criminology or chose one of two pathways. The first is the Law pathway which can opted into in Levels 5 and 6. Learners will combine the study of criminology with the study of law, taking two Law modules in level 5 and two in level 6. This pathway will give learners the opportunity to critically examine legal aspects of the criminal justice system.

Learners could alternatively opt to chose the Forensic Studies pathway following the core level 4 programme. At level 5 learners on this pathway will take two Forensic modules and in Level 6 they will take a furhter two Forensic modules. This pathway will give learners the opporutnity to examine skills necessary for the collection and preserving of forensic evidence.

The learning and teaching strategy for this programme is influenced by the desire to create a meaningful learning journey in which learners build confidence alongside knowledge and understanding of their disciplines. Active learning strategies are designed into individual modules with the use of workshop style learning across the curriculum. Assessment related tasks are built into workshops and seminars to create an authentic assessment experience for learners. Discussion based activities are in every module which supports our commitment to a meaningful learning journey where learners will apply their knowledge to offer solutions to criminological and social problems. Study groups will be created in level 4 to facilitate cooperative learning whilst also helping students to settle into BNU by working closely with a few students on a regular basis. An Academic Skills programme will be a feature of Level 4 where learners will develop the necessary skills to facilitate their academic journey. Cooperative learning, inclusion and respect are key to the learning and teaching strategy in this programme.
